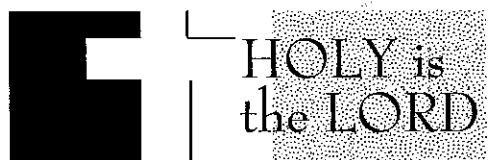

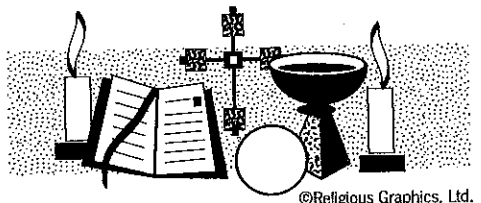

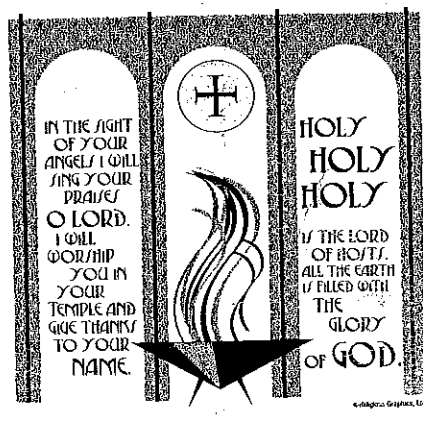

Pastoral Report sent to Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann on 01/13/2022

January 13, 2022

Upon completion of my 2021 Pastoral Annual Report, I regret the oversight of not reporting the strength, successes, and challenges of the mission of Sacred Heart Catholic Grade School, which is the second essential mission of Sacred Heart Catholic Parish. The mission of our grade school serves not only the Catholic community in Ottawa but also several non-Catholic families who see the benefits of providing a Catholic education for their children. Please receive this addendum to be included with my recent 2021 Pastoral Annual Report.


1) Strengths:

- a. Mrs. Lisa Blaes, Principal, and faculty have maintained a 24/7 vigilance/response during the pandemic, i.e., providing weekly, sometimes more often, collaborating with parents, the Franklin County Health Department, the Superintendent of Catholic Schools Office, and made informative decisions to insure a safe student learning environment.
- b. In May 2021, Mrs. Blaes shared with mass participants the fact that the 5th Grade Class scored higher on the Kansas State Assessment than the state average for public schools and higher than the archdiocesan average in all subjects.
- c. Accomplished the standing goal by coordinating the painting of school hallways and upgrading of electrical lighting in classrooms at a cost slightly more than \$27,000 and acquired \$19,000 of materials to improve the quality of science curriculum.
- d. Met weekly and sometimes daily with the pastor for collaboration on strategic planning, administrative concerns, scheduling weekly pastor classroom visits and confirming the celebration of weekly mass with students on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
- e. Under Mrs. Blaes leadership, the School Advisory Council was created and restructured into various committees responsible for collaborating on the school's tuition formula, the 2021-2022 annual school budget, and the 2022 School BASH fund-raiser.
- f. The 2021 academic school year began with an increase of 12 students bringing the school's student enrollment to 97 August.

- g. The grade school resumed its hot lunch program in August 2021 with the addition of two new employees recruited by Mrs. Blaes.
 - h. Sacred Heart Catholic Grade School administration and faculty attend have prioritized attending a monthly in-service day sponsored by the School of Faith.
 - i. Students at Sacred Heart School are fully invested in the “corporal and spiritual works of mercy,” assisting weekly with collecting non-perishable food items and other materials that are then delivered to service agencies in Ottawa to support people in need.
- 2) Goals:
- a. Under the leadership of Mrs. Blaes, the school administration has established the goal to develop a strategic plan.
 - b. Collaborate on ways to increase student enrollment with the hope of adding a 6th grade.
- 3) Challenges:
- a. Many potential variables can affect the school’s operation. For example, emergencies, in-climate weather, loss of enrollment, and a teacher’s resignation, etc.
 - b. Sacred Heart Grade School, under the leadership of its principal, Mrs. Blaes, has met many challenges, prior to the onset and continuation of the ongoing current pandemic. The most pressing challenge has been to find enough hours in the day and evening to address administrative requirements, reports, and planning. She continues to place the needs of students, faculty, and staff above her own as an administrator.
- 4) Much has been accomplished in Sacred Heart Catholic School these past eighteen months program to include expanding a vision and learning to do some things differently. Based on the school’s progress in the recent two years, I intend to offer Mrs. Blaes a contract for the 2022-2023 school term. Although she may or may not accept it, that is her prerogative.

I thank you for taking time to review this addition to my 2021 Pastoral Annual Report. Should you have a need for clarification on any of the materials presented, please contact me at your convenience.

One Minute Meditations

Want to make better decisions?

The best decisions are those made in harmony with God's will. And, a close relationship with God brings a strong sense of what He wants for us. When we grow distant and distracted, our perception of His will grows dim and the right course of action becomes less obvious. Prayer and Scripture reading help to bring clarity.



The right way to pray

Think of prayer as a focused conversation between two people who love each other. There is no one right way to pray. It is most rewarding when you talk to your loved one as often as possible, giving Him the best of your attention. Pope John Paul II said, "Pray any way you like, so long as you do pray." God is always ready to listen.

Rediscover God's love for you

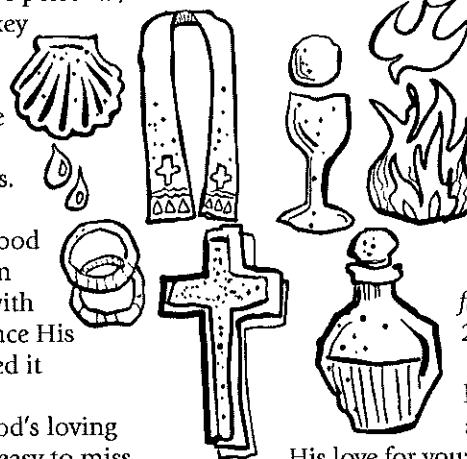
"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1). In these challenging times, being grounded in God's personal, powerful love is key to staying strong, positive, at peace, and able to handle whatever happens. A time of uncertainty is a good time to strengthen our connection with God and experience His love when we need it most.

Make room. God's loving presence may be easy to miss, especially if we do more talking than listening. Sometimes prayer means we talk at God instead of to Him. It is best to listen in the silence of our hearts. In prayer, open your heart to hear what He has to say. "*Speak, Lord, for your*

servant is listening" (1 Sam 3:10).

Embrace the Sacraments. More than just symbols, Sacraments are personal encounters with God's unlimited love and grace. For example, in Confession, we receive Christ's powerful, healing love. In the Eucharist, we encounter Jesus and his love for us, "*in the flesh*" (Matthew 26:26-28) at every Mass. Find a devotion that helps you focus on God and better understand

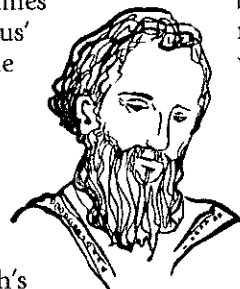
His love for you: the Rosary, Eucharistic Adoration, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, praying novenas, reciting litanies, attending daily Mass. Devotions highlight some aspect of God's intensely personal love for us and gives us ways to respond.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics call St. James the "brother of the Lord?"

St. Mark's Gospel names St. James as one of Jesus' "brothers" (6:3). In the original languages of the Bible, "brother" included other male relatives. Additionally, tradition holds that Cleopas was St. Joseph's



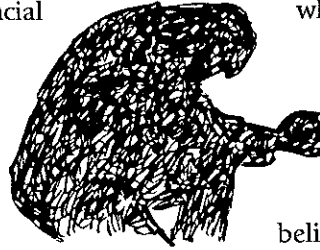
brother and James was his son, making him Jesus' cousin. Either way, the Church has always taught Mary's perpetual virginity, meaning Jesus (who was miraculously conceived) was her only child. This explains why Jesus entrusted Mary to St. John and not a sibling He didn't have (John 19:26-27).

Find peace in difficult times

If you follow news about national or world events, the reporting can rob you of peace. With stories of financial insecurity, unemployment, disease, depression, and division, how can we find peace?

Talk it out. Bringing worries into the light and confiding them to someone we trust can cut them down to size. Even better – talk about worries with God. Prayer has the added advantage of surrendering your problems into powerful hands. “Jesus, I trust in You!”

Focus on what you can do, not what you can't.



Stress results from feeling powerless. Focusing on what we can't do can “paralyze” our problem-solving abilities. Start making a list of steps you can take toward solving your problem. Whatever is beyond your control, leave to God.

Immerse yourself in God's all-powerful love. Whether we feel it or not, whether we believe it or not, we are God's precious children.

He watches over us very closely. He knows what we can handle and is more than ready to help us with all the rest.

from Scripture

Luke 6:39-45, Fraternal correction begins with “me”

There is a danger to following someone who doesn't know the way to God. In Jesus' time, a young man would apply to a rabbi to become one of his students. The student would live with the rabbi, study with him, and assist him with his work. As a result, the student might take on the teacher's philosophy and values. Jesus cautioned His followers to choose their leaders carefully.

Then again, Jesus pointed out that it's easier to see someone else's faults and miss our own. Jesus gave the example of a man trying to warn his friend of a speck of dust in his eye, when

he himself is blind to the plank of wood in his own. Therefore, Jesus said we must first deal with our own faults before correcting others.



We are called to be disciples of Jesus Christ – God Himself –

through whom we have eternal life. Like the disciples in Biblical times, we are called to stay close to Christ, let His grace transform us, and to live according to His values. Finally, we are called to bring Him to others.

Q & A How can we celebrate the Presentation?

The Presentation is when Jesus' parents brought Him to the Temple to consecrate Him to God, in accord with ancient Jewish Law. Celebrating the feast of the Presentation of Our Lord



began as early as the fourth century AD.

The candle connection. We recall Simeon's prayer, in which he honored Jesus as “a light to reveal [God] to the nations” (Luke 2:32). Priests bless hundreds of candles and give them to the faithful for home use, lending this feast its other name: Candlemas.

Pancakes and crêpes are the traditional food for this day because of their light color. Treat yourself to anything that reminds you of the light and joy of this last “Christmas” feast day, like white chocolate, ice-cream, popcorn, mashed potatoes, etc.

Give back. God gave everything He had to save us because we mean everything to Him. Mary and Joseph made a ritual sacrifice in gratitude for their Son. In gratitude for His sacrifice, put something extra in the poor box at church in His honor.

Feasts & Celebrations

Feb. 2 – Presentation of the Lord. In accordance with Moses' Law, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple forty days after his birth. Simeon praised God for revealing the long-awaited Savior, saying, “Lord, now you let your servant depart in peace, according to thy word” (Luke 2:29).

Feb. 5 - St. Agatha (251). St. Agatha dedicated herself to God and kept this vow despite torture and imprisonment. God sent her a vision of St. Peter to comfort her, heal her, and fill her dungeon with heavenly light.

Feb. 22 – St. Margaret of Cortona (1297). St. Margaret's conversion came after the sudden death of the man she was having an affair with. Shaken, she repented and became a Franciscan tertiary. She founded a hospital and an order of Tertiary sisters to operate it.

Feb. 28 – Sts. Romanus and Lupicinus (460). Saint Romanus became a hermit when he was 35. Later, his brother St. Lupicinus joined him in religious life. Together they founded two monasteries and a convent.
